General Instructions/Evaluations:

The summer reading list is compiled to reflect the eighth grade theme of the quest for justice and citizenship in society. While reading, students should mark their books with underlining and take detailed notes on the central conflict that the main character of each book experiences. Consider how the role of discrimination and the need to belong influence character behaviors and decisions. Furthermore, students should be well-acquainted with the *who*, *what*, *when*, and *where* of each story. Keeping a reading journal may be helpful, but it is not required.

Students will be expected to participate in discussion generated by each summer reading book, to take a multiple choice test on the summer reading books, and to compose a paper that reflects how the theme of the quest for justice and citizenship in society is exemplified in each book. These assignments will be given during the first week of school. Students will find it helpful to read the book of choice first, *The Hiding Place* second, and *The Outsiders* last. Students will also turn in their books during the first week of school, and the book annotations in each book will be graded.

Please remember the B.A. policy: do not consult Cliff's Notes, Spark Notes, internet novel guides, or any other electronic or printed summaries: work with the text themselves.
